GA Senate Resolution 293 By: Senators Ligon, Jr. of the 3rd, Watson of the 1st, Jackson of the 2nd, Hill of the 4th, Cowsert of the 46th and others

RESOLUTION

Recognizing Georgia's first state historical song, known worldwide as "Kumbaya";

WHEREAS, the Library of Congress has documented American folk songs throughout the nation's history; and

WHEREAS, the first director of the Archive of American Folk-Song at the Library of Congress, Robert Winslow Gordon, pioneered early efforts to record folk songs by transporting his heavy wax cylinder recorder by rail, car, horse, and boat to remote regions of the nation; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Gordon traveled to Darien and the Sea Islands of Georgia in 1926 to record numerous folk songs in the Gullah Dialect, also known as the Sea Islands Creole Dialect; and

WHEREAS, Mr. H. Wylie, an African American of Gullah-Geechee heritage, gave permission for him to record the spiritual folk song "Come by Here"; and

WHEREAS, the Library of Congress states that this is the first known recording of "Come by Here," a song that came to be known as "Kumbaya"; and

WHEREAS, "Kumbaya," first recorded in Georgia, has become a song with national significance in American culture.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE that the members of this body recognize this historical song of Georgia and its significance to our state and to the Gullah-Geechee culture.

The following quote is an excerpt from a speech that has been referred to as one of the best commencement speeches ever delivered

"During Naval SEAL (Sea, Air, Land military special forces) training the students are broken down into boat crews. Each crew consists of seven students - three on each side of a small rubber boat and one helmsman to help guide the dingy. Every day the boat crews form up on the beach and are instructed to get through the surf zone and paddle several miles down the coast. In the winter, the surf can get to be 8 to 10 feet high, and it is exceedingly difficult to paddle through the plunging surf unless everyone digs in deep. Every paddle must be synchronized to the stroke count of the helmsman. Everyone must exert equal effort or the boat will turn against the wave and be tossed back on the beach. For the boat to make its destination, everyone must paddle.

You can't change the world alone - you will need some help. To truly get from your starting point to your destination takes friends, colleagues, the goodwill of strangers and a strong helmsman to guide them. If you want to change the world, find people to help you paddle."

Women in History: Lee Hedden

Katherine Coleman Goble Johnson Physicist and Mathematician

Katherine Coleman Goble Johnson is an African American physicist and mathematician who made contributions to the US aeronautics and space programs with the early application of digital electronic computers at NASA.

Katherine Coleman, aka "The Human Computer", was born in 1918 in White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia, to Joshua and Joylette Coleman.

Johnson made the most of limited educational opportunities for African Americans. After completing high school at the age of 14, she graduated *summa cum laude* in 1937 from West Virginia College at age 18 and began a teaching career at a black public school in Virginia.

In 1939, she left her teaching job and enrolled in the graduate math program at West Virginia University, becoming the first African-American woman to desegregate the graduate school at WVU. However, she withdrew after one semester, choosing to start a family with her husband James Francis Goble. They had three daughters. James Goble died in 1956 of an inoperable brain tumor.

Johnson began working in aeronautics as a "computer" in 1952, and after the formation of NASA, she performed the calculations that sent astronauts into orbit in the early 1960s and to the moon in 1969. She calculated the trajectory for the 1961 space flight of Alan Shepard, the first American in space. When John Glenn was waiting to be fired into orbit in 1962, there was one person he trusted with the complex trajectory calculations required to bring him down safely from his orbital space flight: It was Katherine Johnson.

In 1959, Katherine Goble married Lt. Colonel James A. Johnson and continued her career at NASA. Johnson has six grandchildren and eleven great-grandchildren.

President Barack Obama presented Johnson with the Presidential Medal of Freedom, November 24, 2015. Johnson has authored numerous papers and received numerous science and technology awards.

Johnson has been portrayed in the media. In 2016, the Oscar nominated film *Hidden Figures* was released based on the non-fiction book of the same name by Margot Lee Shetterly.

Johnson continues to reside in Virginia.

She is excited to "pay it forward" by putting her leadership skills to work leading her peers at this year's Northwest Georgia session set for June 2-4 at Agnes Scott College.

TFS Board of Trustees Chairwoman Amy Atkinson has been involved with HOBY for many years, raising funds and providing support for events. Over the past four years, she has worked as a group facilitator.

"I would like to congratulate Grace on being selected to serve as a HOBY Junior Staff member. As a Junior Staff member, Grace will assist with event set up and clean up, greeting new ambassadors and most importantly, setting the example of volunteerism to younger peers," Atkinson said. "The HOBY experience helps young people to discover and develop their leadership abilities through service to others. Grace exemplifies the volunteer spirit by her willingness to help lead the next class of HOBY Ambassadors."

Proposed Bylaw and Standing Rules Changes –

(To be voted on at the March General Meeting)

BYLAWS

Article III – Membership, Section 2, b.

b. Active Members shall be those members who pay dues according to Section 4, Dues, and who assume their total responsibilities for the Club. To remain a member in good standing, active members shall attend a minimum of four of the nine general meetings and six of the Community Service Program meetings annually. The Membership Committee shall review absences in excess of this standard.

PROPOSED CHANGE: Delete last sentence. **Add** first sentence of Standing Rule 4.

ARTICLE WOULD READ –

b. Active Members shall be those members who pay dues according to Section 4, Dues, and who assume their responsibilities for the Club. To remain a member in good standing, active members shall attend a minimum of four of the nine general meetings, six of the Community Service Program meetings and serve a minimum of eight hours on the Club's major ways and means project annually.

Article III – Membership, Section 2, c.

c. Associate Members.

1) shall be members who pay dues according to Section 4, Dues, and assume total responsibility of the major ways and means project of the Club.

PROPOSED CHANGE: Add first sentence of Standing Rule 4.

ARTICLE WOULD READ:

1) shall be members who pay dues according to Section 4, Dues, and serve a minimum of eight hours on the Club's major ways and means project annually.

RATIONALE: Combine Bylaws and Standing Rule.

Article VIII – Duties of the Executive Board and Chairmen

Section 7. The Hours Chairman shall collect and record the twenty-four service hours of members.

PROPOSED CHANGE: Eliminate the position of Hours Chairman from DWC Committees and **renumber** Sections.

STANDING RULES

3. Each active member shall be expected to serve a minimum of twenty-four hours a year on Club sponsored projects. Board meetings and general meetings are not to be counted.

PROPOSED CHANGE: Eliminate Standing Rule 3 and **renumber** Standing Rules.

RATIONALE: Bylaws and Standing Rules should reflect current practice.

4. Active and associate members are expected to serve a minimum of eight hours on the Club's major ways and means project. The guidelines for participation shall be announced and published in the newsletter.

PROPOSED CHANGE: **Eliminate** Standing Rule 4, **Move** first sentence to Bylaws, Article III, Membership, Section 2, b and c, 1) and **renumber** Standing Rules.
