Now is the most important time of the year to take action and ensure our members of Congress are supporting childhood vaccination programs in the hardest to reach areas of the developing world. Legislation: Linda Mote

Some of the bills that passed the 2018 GA Legislative session:

Pending the governor's signature, Georgia will soon become the 16th state in the U.S. to enact a hands-free driving law. The House gave final passage to a proposal that would prevent drivers from holding their cell phones while behind the wheel. Proponents say drivers who look at their phones are largely responsible for a recent spike in fatal crashes in Georgia -- and the resulting rise in auto insurance premiums.

Transportation-A regional transit authority, called the ATL would be responsible for overseeing transit expansion in the area.

Medical-Georgia lawmakers have agreed to expand the state's medical cannabis oil program to include those with post-traumatic stress disorder or intractable pain.

Domestic Violence House leases-Georgia lawmakers have given final passage to a proposal that would allow victims of domestic violence to terminate housing leases early without paying penalties. The House voted 166-0 on Thursday in favor of the measure, sending it to the governor's desk. Under the proposal, victims who have received a domestic violence order in either criminal or civil court proceeding will be eligible to terminate their lease early. Proponents say victims who are trying to escape a dangerous environment should not have to worry about the fees if they break their lease.

FEDERATION FACTS

MISSION STATEMENT

The General Federation of Women's Clubs is an international organization dedicated to community improvement by enhancing the lives of others through volunteer service.

GFWC FOUNDING

GFWC's roots can be traced back to 1868, when professional journalist Jane Cunningham Croly of New York City, attempted to attend a lecture by novelist Charles Dickens at an all-male press club. Denied entrance on account of her gender, "Jennie June" formed a woman's club, naming it Sorosis, a Greek word meaning an "aggregation; a sweet flavor of many fruits." In celebration of its 21st anniversary in 1889, Sorosis members

proposed a conference of women's clubs to pursue the cause of federation. That conference was held in New York City on March 20, 1889, with the goal of preparing a constitution for ratification the following year. Clubs that already applied for membership in the new General Federation of Women's Clubs were invited to the ratification convention, which was held at the Scottish Rite Hall in New York City, April 23-25, 1890. Sixty-three delegates from 17 states attended. After some discussion and amendments, the constitution was ratified on April 24, which GFWC members continue to celebrate as **Federation Day.**

"UNITY IN DIVERSITY" MOTTO

Ella Dietz Clymer gained a particular place of honor in Federation history as the author of the GFWC motto, "Unity in Diversity." Speaking to the delegates at the first Federation conference in 1889, she said, "We hope that you will enrich us by your varied experiences…." The aptness of the motto is evident in the diverse interests and talents of GFWC members, who have implemented a broad range of programs and projects tailored to meet the needs of their communities. Adopted as the official motto in 1957, "Unity in Diversity" set the tone for the flexibility that has enabled GFWC to grow and adapt to the changing lifestyles and concerns of women throughout more than a century of volunteer work.

In May, we'll learn about the history of the Emblem, the GFWC flag and the Federation flower and song.

By-laws – April 2018 newsletter - Judy Bertrand

Please review the following proposed by-laws changes that will be voted on at the April 19, 2018 General Meeting.

Proposed DWC By-Laws Changes

ARTICLE III Section 4(b)

Current: A person applying for membership shall pay a minimum of \$30.00 Initiation fee.

Change: A person applying for membership shall pay a minimum of \$30.00 Application fee. Dues as outlined in Section 4 (a) are applicable the following year

Rationale: Clarifying statement added to reflect current Club operations.

ARTICLE VIII, Section 3

Current: The **Newsletter Editor** shall compile and mail a newsletter within five days of each Executive Board meeting. It shall be distributed to the membership and certain District and State Officers, and one copy filed with the Historian for the record.

Change: The **Newsletter Editor** shall compile a newsletter within five days of each Executive Board meeting. It shall be distributed to the membership and certain District and State Officers, and one copy filed with the Historian for the record.

RATIONALE: To comply with current Club operations.

ARTICLE VIII, Section 2 (c)

Current: The **Membership Committee** shall consist of the Membership Chairman, Hours Chairman, and three members selected by the Membership Chairman. This committee shall assist the Membership Chairman in her duties and be responsible for reviewing the current status of Club members and prospective members.

Change: The Membership Committee shall consist of the Membership Chairman and four members selected by the Membership Chairman. This committee shall assist the Membership Chairman in her duties and be responsible for reviewing the current status of Club members and prospective members.

RATIONALE: The Club no longer counts member hours and the position of Hours Chairman has been eliminated.

ARTICLE VIII, Section 2 (b)

Current: The **Finance Committee** shall consist of five members: the Treasurer who shall be the Chairman, the Ways and Means Chairman, the retiring President, the retiring Treasurer and one other member appointed by the President. It shall be the responsibility of the Finance Committee to plan and submit a budget for the year to the Executive Board and to exercise general foresight of the financial affairs of the Club.

Change: The **Finance Committee** shall consist of five members: the Treasurer who shall be the Chairman, the Ways and Means Chairman, the retiring President, the retiring Treasurer and one other member appointed by the President. It shall be the responsibility of the Finance Committee to plan and submit a budget for the year to the Executive Board and to exercise general foresight of the financial affairs of the Club. The President will serve as an ex-officio member.

RATIONALE: To reflect current Club operations.

ARTICLE VIII Section 2 (e)

Current: The **Revisions/Bylaws Committee** shall consist of a Chairman, appointed by the President, and as many members as the Chairman deems necessary, with the Parliamentary Advisor serving as consultant.

Change: The **Revisions/Bylaws Committee** shall consist of a Chairman, appointed by the President, and as many members as the Chairman deems necessary, with the Parliamentary Advisor serving as consultant. The President will serve as an ex-officio member.

RATIONALE: To reflect current Club operations.
