Back to School Volunteering

August is National Back to School Month, so now that it’s August it’s a great time to start thinking of ways you can support teachers, students, and schools in your community. Consider the following volunteer ideas!

- **Collect supplies for students.** Donating backpacks and school supplies is a popular project among GFWC clubs because low-income students shouldn’t have to worry about falling behind at school because they can’t afford the tools to succeed. Collect supplies at club meetings and host a school supplies drive in your community so families in need can start the year off right.
- **Volunteer for before-school and after-school activities.** Those programs keep students engaged physically, emotionally, and academically. Additionally, they provide a space to grow, learn, and develop a sense of community belonging. Programs vary from providing homework assistance to encouraging physical activity. Oftentimes the programs are underfunded, so contact your local schools to see if they need volunteers! **Consider reading to the kindergarten students at High Tower!**
- **Make Teacher Care Baskets.** It’s tough to be a teacher, demonstrated by the wave of teacher strikes earlier this year where educators voiced concerns of low wages, insufficient school budgets, and more. Show teachers in your community that you value everything they do. You can make gift baskets filled with supplies that will be useful in their classroom, including tissues (because with so many students and sickness so easily spread, they can never have too many!) markers, highlighters, scissors, post-it notes, and more. While they’ll most appreciate gifts that are functional, it couldn’t hurt to throw in a thoughtful gift like chocolate too! **DWC hosted breakfast for the first day back at High Tower, but gift baskets could be a project throughout the year!**
- **Be proactive – ask the school what they need.** When in doubt for how you can help, simply reach out to the schools in your town and ask how you can be of most assistance to them! There might be opportunities you’d never know about otherwise, or resources they need that you’d never think to donate. They’ll be sure to appreciate hardworking volunteers with as much spirit as GFWC clubwomen.

Schools play an integral role in communities, and it’s important that the community gives back to them. Use this time to plan how your club can make a difference not just in the next few months but all year long!

Women in History: Suzanne Bentz

August 2019 — Chef Leah Chase

A few decades ago, on a business trip to New Orleans, I was introduced to the culinary delights of Creole cooking and po-boy sandwiches at Dooky Chase's Restaurant in the 6th Ward. At the time, this Yankee did not know that po-boys could be served dressed or in the buff. I recall the waiter said “nekked” but I'm not sure that is proper in today's PC-obsessed world. I discovered I like them dressed and every once in a while, I get a hankering for a good shrimp po-boy...but nothing locally compares to the transformative ambiance and utter goodness served up at Dooky Chase's Restaurant in New Orleans. Thus it was with great sadness that I learned earlier this summer that Dooky's owner, the Queen of Creole Cuisine, Leah Chase, passed away at the age of 96.

Leah was born to Catholic Creole parents. She developed her knowledge of produce during the Great Depression, helping to cultivate the family's land where okra, peas, green beans, and strawberries were grown. After high school, Leah held several jobs, but her favorite was working as a waitress. In 1946, she married jazz trumpeter and band leader Edgar “Dooky” Chase II. Leah worked in the kitchen at a corner stand owned by Dooky's parents. Eventually, the young couple took over the stand and converted

it into a white-cloth, sit-down restaurant with updated recipes reflecting Leah's Creole background. The restaurant also gained acclaim as an art gallery due to Leah's extensive display of African-American art throughout. (Known for her love of art, Leah was one of the first African-American women to serve on the board of the New Orleans Museum of Art.)

Leah and Dooky broke segregation laws by seating black and white patrons together and used their restaurant as a civil rights meeting place. Freedom Riders, Martin Luther King Jr, Barack Obama, George W. Bush dined there. Local musicians provided entertainment on weekends. And Leah's Southern dishes won her national acclaim. Last year, "Food & Wine" named Dooky Chase's Restaurant as one of the 40 most important restaurants of the past 40 years. Leah "was the inspiration for Princess Tiana in the 2009 Disney film 'Princess and the Frog.' She also was featured in Beyonce's 'Lemonade' music video."

Leah Chase knew that good food could bring people together and help break down barriers of all kinds. Her family released a statement upon her passing underscoring her belief: "Her daily joy was not simply cooking but preparing meals to bring people together. One of her most prized contributions was advocating for the Civil Rights Movement through feeding those on the front lines of the struggle for human dignity."
