Miranda's Law seeks to make an employer notification service for school bus drivers across the country mandatory. This would require school bus drivers to register and would notify employers within 24 hours when the driver receives a moving violation.

It's one of GFWC's Brand Initiatives to get clubwomen to make 1,000 contacts through phone calls or emails to their Congressional representatives on September 23, 2019. Miranda's Law will create universal safety regulations to help keep students safe when they ride the school bus.

**From the GFWC Legislative Action Center**

If you join The Legislative Action Center you will have a powerful tool for GFWC's public issues and advocacy efforts. Track bills, contact your local representative and take action on issues germane to GFWC Resolutions

“GFWC strongly supports the passage of **H.R. 1923 and S. 2427, The Women's History and Nineteenth Amendment Centennial Quarter Dollar Coin Program Act**. These bills will celebrate the **centennial of the Nineteenth Amendment** by honoring the contributions of prominent women from each state, the District of Columbia, and U.S. territories. Similar to the 50 States Quarter Program, the Women's History and Nineteenth Amendment Centennial Quarter Dollar Coin Program Act would create a new series of commemorative circulating coins, which highlight women suffragists and other trailblazers on the reverse side of the U.S. quarter. *GFWC members were at the forefront of women's suffrage* with a delegation marching in the 1913 Suffrage Parade on Pennsylvania Ave., which began to change public opinion on suffrage. Many of the leaders of the suffrage movement were members of GFWC, including Carrie Chapman Catt, Jane Addams, and Lizzie Crozier French as well as former GFWC Presidents Ellen Henrotin and Sarah Decker Platt. A formal organizational endorsement came in 1914 with a resolution supporting the “political equality of men and women. For these reasons and many more, GFWC supports **H.R. 1923 and S. 2427**. This important milestone must be properly recognized and honored, and we believe that these bills will allow our nation to do just that.”

“**Celebrating the Centennial**-Write to your members of Congress in support of commemorative coins honoring the centennial of women's suffrage!

**End Campus Sexual Assault**-Victims of sexual assault require specialized medical treatment and counseling services. Campus sexual assault survivors suffer high rates of PTSD, depression, and drug or alcohol abuse which can hamper both the ability to succeed in school and future employment.

## **Women in History: Suzanne Bentz**

What did Harriet Quimby do in 1912? That was one of the questions put to the Trivia Teams gathered at Downwind at PDK Airport a few Wednesdays ago. Our team got the answer partially correct. Some thought she swam across the English Channel. She did not. The correct answer: Harriet piloted her new two-seater plane across the English Channel. The first woman to do so. While some records claim her feat occurred in 1911, as did our Trivia Night emcee, not to worry. Her achievement was pretty remarkable by any account.

And that's the magic of Trivia Team nights at pubs and restaurants across metro Atlanta. Besides enjoying the company of friends and neighbors, Trivia Night is like pressure washing your brain. The questions make you think, dredge up information learned decades ago, keep current with world news, or you race home and do some research on winning responses. That's why I knew that, with a little digging, Harriet Quimby would be a good subject for our Women in History column.

Harriet was born in Michigan in 1875. She moved with her family to California and ultimately became a journalist, writing for the "San Francisco Chronicle" and "San Francisco Call." She became fascinated with aviation while touring and writing about airshows for "Leslie's Illustrated Weekly," extolling the potential of commercial aviation and promoting the "sport" as ideal for women. According to Wikipedia, Harriet took her pilot's test on August 1, 1911 "and became the first U.S. woman to earn an Aero Club of America aviator's certificate." She also authored screenplays that year which were made into silent film shorts. In 1912 she became the spokesperson for Vin Fiz, a new grape soda. Her favored purple aviator uniform probably won her the position.

Tragically, Harriet Quimby's stardom was short lived. The Dresden China Aviatrix, as she was known for her petite stature, fell to her death on July 1, 1912, when she ejected with a fellow pilot from her two-seater monoplane in an unsanctioned air meet over Quantum, Massachusetts, only months after her English Channel flight.

What is remarkable is that in her short life, Harriet Quimby proved that women can do just about anything they want by pursuing their passions and pushing the envelope in their quest for adventure and knowledge. To that point, Harriet Quimby has been featured on a 1991 United States airmail postage stamp and inducted into the National Aviation Hall of Fame in 2004 and the Long Island Air and Space Hall of Fame in 2012.
